### Winter Birding on the South Fork

Watching birds in winter can be a less than enjoyable experience when confronted with freezing weather and howling wind. One way to change that is to bird from the comfort and security of your automobile. Another benefit is that a car makes an excellent mobile blind, which most birds do not associate with danger. The result is that you are often treated to very close views that would not be possible if you were on foot. This map is designed to steer you to some of the more productive and accessible locations available by car.

The South Fork of Long Island is located near the northern limit of some southern species and the southern limit of some northern species. The area is also host to a multitude of migrating birds as they make their way to and from their breeding territories to our north and their wintering grounds to our south. The magnitude and diversity of these migrants and seasonal residents reaches its peak in fall and winter. At this season it is possible to see birds that do not frequent our area at other times of the year. There is also the possibility of seeing species that make it as far south as Long Island only sporadically; for example winter finches and Snowy Owls. Additionally, there is always a chance that you may find a real rarity that has come from the far interior of the country or the arctic. We hope that you find this map useful and if you find a particularly unusual bird or fruitful birding location we would be grateful to hear about it.




**Section 1- Montauk** 

Montauk Point- Common Loon, Red-throated Loon, \*Red-necked Grebe, Horned Grebe, \*Harlequin Duck, Long-tailed Duck, Common Eider, \*King Eider, Red-breasted Merganser, White-winged Scoter, Surf Scoter, Black Scoter, Glaucous Gull, Iceland Gull, Lesser Blackbacked Gull, Northern Gannet, Razorbill, Blacklegged Kittiwake, Snow Bunting, Harbor Seal. • Montauk Point is a major migration trap for migrating passerines especially in fall and early winter.

Deep Hollow Ranch (Teddy Roosevelt County Park)- Canada Goose, \*Barnacle Goose, \*Snow Goose, Killdeer, Black-bellied Plover, \*Golden Plover, American Pipit, Horned Lark, \*Lapland Longspur, Phoebe, \*Western Kingbird, Merlin, Peregrine Falcon.

• Over the years many rarities have been seen in the pasture south of Montauk Hwy.



# Eastern South Fork

Montauk Lake Inlet- Great Cormorant, Purple Sandpiper, Bonaparte's Gull, Common Loon, Red-throated Loon, Iceland Gull, Glaucous Gull, Red-breasted Merganser, Horned Grebe, Snow Bunting.

• Check out the gulls usually resting on the beach on the East Side (D) across from Gosman's Restaurant.

I South Lake Drive- Bufflehead, Long-tailed Duck, Canvasback, Red-breasted Merganser, Greater Scaup, Horned Grebe, Common Goldeneve.

Culloden Point- \*Red-necked and Horned Grebe, White-winged, Surf and Black Scoter, Common and Red-throated Loon, Razorbill. • Partial Dirt Road.

Tuthill Pond & Fort Pond Bay- Hooded Merganser, Ring-necked Duck, Mallard, Black Duck, Ruddy Duck, Greater Scaup, Green-winged Teal. • Check the gulls on the pier behind the Ice House on Fort Pond Bay.

Fort Pond, North & South- Redhead, American Wigeon, \*Eurasian Wigeon, Bufflehead, Ruddy Duck, Canvasback, Lesser and Greater Scaup, Ring-necked Duck, Mute Swan, Pied-billed Grebe, Belted Kingfisher.

# Section 2- Napeague

Walking Dunes- Northern Harrier, \*Snowy Owl, \*Short-eared Owl, \*Rough-legged Hawk, Sanderling.

• The top of the Walking Dune is a good vantage point to watch raptor migration from.The area north of the Walking Dune is the place to look for owls.

Lazy Point- Long-tailed Duck, Common Goldeneye, Bufflehead, Red-breasted Merganser, Double-crested Cormorant, Sanderling, Dunlin, Ruddy Turnstone.

### 3 Section 3– Accabonac & **Three Mile Harbor**

Louse Point- Common Loon, Horned Grebe, \*Red-necked Grebe, White-winged, Surf and Black Scoter, Long-tailed Duck, Great Blue Heron, Horned Lark, Snow Bunting, Ipswich Sparrow.

Landing Lane- Screech Owl, \*Saw-whet Owl, Red-breasted Merganser, Bufflehead, Virginia Rail, Sharp-tailed Sparrow, Yellow-rumped Warbler, \*Eastern Bluebird. • The entire length of the road out to the landing is

good for observing land birds.

Pussy's Pond- Mallard, American Black Duck, Green-winged Teal, Canvasback, Swamp Sparrow, Common Snipe, Belted Kingfisher.

Gerard Drive- Black-bellied Plover, Sanderling, Dunlin, Ruddy Turnstone, \*Greater Yellowlegs, Horned Lark, Snow Bunting.

Maidstone Park- Purple Sandpiper, Whitewinged and Surf Scoter, Carolina Wren, Yellowrumped Warbler, Mute Swan.

• The south side of the loop is good for observing land birds.

Gann Road- Common Goldeneye, \*Barrow's Goldeneye, Bufflehead, Red-breasted Merganser, Horned Grebe, Long-tailed Duck.

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




