THE ARTS SCENE



Vital Action: Release your inner artist at an all ages space comrad.ca

What Was Graded:

admission fees, access to programs & performances... theatre, literature, dance, film, music and festivals.

Arts Scene Growth

In 2009, Calgary hosted over 5,800 arts events and saw over 450,000 people attend events free of charge, up 78% from the previous year.

Careers in the Arts

Over 7,000 students graduate annually from Calgary's four major post-secondary institutions with creative industries-related degrees.

What Was Graded: promotion of mental and physical health, access to addiction counseling, family and youth clinics.



Youth Smoking

Calgary has the lowest rate of youth cigarette smokers (grades 7-12) in Alberta (5.2%), but the highest rate of youth who smoked cannabis in the past year (20.1%).

Screen Time

Calgary's youth, aged 12 - 19, sit in front of their computer or television an average of 18.3 hours a week, compared to the national average of 17.7 hours a week.

YOUTH HOUSING & HOMELESSNESS

What Was Graded: youth homelessness, cost of housing and renting.

Vital Action: Make sandwiches for the homeless spreadthelove.ca

Street-Involved Youth

71% of Calgary's street-involved youth report having experienced neglect or abuse and 45% report being kicked out of school, suspended, or having dropped out of school.

Street Drug Use

94% of Calgary's street-involved youth report using tobacco, alcohol or drugs in the past two weeks, while 29% report using alcohol or drugs before turning 12.

What Was Graded:

YOUTH SPACES

Biggest Free Outdoor Skate Park Calgary's Shaw Millennium Park is North America's largest free outdoor 24 hour skate park hosting 35,000 visitors annually.

Places to Hang Out

The City of Calgary provides seven leisure centres and 56 parks and gardens where youth can exercise and socialize.

SAFETY

Vital Action: Become a Student Ambassador kidshelpphone.ca

What Was Graded: crime levels, gang violence, internet exploitation, bullying, relationships with police, emergency preparedness, and sexual exploitation of youth.

Youth Offences Decreasing

Youth offences have decreased by almost 25% since 2005.

Gang Related Homicides Decreasing

Gang related homicides have decreased by over 50% since 2008. In 2009, there were seven gang related homicides reported, a rate lower than pre-2005 levels.

Vital Action: Be inspired by youth doing great things youthareawesome.com

What Was Graded: voting, participation on advisory committees, youth activism, and getting involved in community.


Youth Involvement

Each year, Youth Central sees 2300 youth volunteers contribute over 32,000 hours to the Calgary community.

Learning About Voting

Student Vote combats low voter turnout among 18 – 25 year olds by teaching the democratic process to future youth voters. In the 2008 general election, 130 schools in Calgary participated in a parallel election where 22,436 students cast ballots.

Higher Tuition Fees

The average cost of post-secondary tuition in Alberta is \$5,520, \$600 higher than the national average.

Smaller Class Sizes

In 2008/2009, the average class size for junior and senior public high schools in Calgary was 22.8 and 24.3 students respectively, both less than the Alberta Commission on Learning guidelines of 25 and 27 respectively.

Students Composting

Since 2007, Green Calgary has introduced 15 composting sites into Calgary's public schools... all to be maintained by students.

Schools Become EcoSites

In 2009, The Calgary Board of Education (CBE) launched EcoSites to "Advance Operational Environmental Literacy". Schools will be rated as Emerging Green, Green, or Leading Green. CBE's target is to have all schools become EcoSites by 2012.

Calgarians Love Sports

Approximately 320,000 Calgarians engage in 85 different sports administered by over 400 organizations. On average, youth aged 13 -19 participate in at least one sport activity.

After-School Programs

In 2009, Calgary became the first Canadian municipality to coordinate a city-wide approach to after-school programs that offer 193 supervised activities for youth between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m.

Youth Transit Users

Over 15,000 students, from both private and public schools, use one of Calgary Transit's 29 direct bus routes to get to junior or senior high school on a given day.

Urban Pathways

With over 700 km of pathways and nearly 290 km of on-street bikeways, Calgary has the most extensive urban pathway and bikeway network in North America.

ESL Students Triple

Between 1988 and 2008, Alberta's ESL (English as a second language) students tripled from 14,673 to 48,346. In 2009, 29 % of Calgary's Grade 3 students were ESL students, compared to the provincial average of 13 %.

Multicultural Festivals Thrive

The Calgary Multicultural Centre lists 24 prominent multicultural festivals that are held annually, and posts hundreds of smaller events at calgarymulti.com

Employment & Training

High Level of Student Workers

In 2008/2009, 46% of Alberta's youth, aged 15 - 19, worked while attending primary or secondary school, compared to the national average of 35%.

Economic Downturn Affects Youth

In October 2009, the unemployment rate for Calgary's youth reached 15.3 % - twice the rate of unemployed adults.

HIGHLIGHTS - 2010 SURVEY

In every issue area graded, youth who reported being very connected to their community gave the highest grades and youth who reported being not connected at all gave the lowest grades.

Over 90 % of graders live with family, yet the key issue area of youth homelessness and housing received a C, one of the lowest grades. With an estimated 700 people under the age of 24 living on the streets, graders identified this area as one of the top priorities that needs immediate community investment.

Recreation & Sports received a B, one of the highest grades, with 54% of youth reporting participation in community activities while acknowledging that fees are a barrier for some.

Over 140,000 youth aged 24 and under are living in Calgary, yet graders say there are few opportunities to "have a voice" and gave the issue area of Youth Voice a C.

As graders, the top 3 changes that would improve our quality of life are: better transportation lower recreation fees

- affordable education


From emails, Twitter, friends on Facebook or at school, **1235 YOUTH** took up the invitation to HAVE THEIR SAY.

- 55% volunteer



THERE'S MORE TO READ ONLINE

Approximately 30 members of the Calgary Youth Foundation and the Mayor's Youth Council began the process by identifying 12 key issue areas and selecting the survey questions.

THE SURVEY

The Praxis Group conducted a 3 week online survey targeted at local youth between the ages of 12-24. Praxis provided a complete analysis of the data and presented the key findings in a final 40 page report.

INDEX OF GRADING

- A: Excellent, stay the course
- B: Good, but some improvements could be made
- C: Average performance, suggest additional effort be made to address these issues
- D: Below average performance, additional work is required
- F: Failure, immediate action is crucial
