

Cellist Matt Haimovitz has established himself as one of classical music's most adventurous artists, equally at ease playing the masterworks for his instrument in solo, chamber and concerto performances in leading concert halls, as he is in bringing classical music to new listeners in alternative venues.

In 1984, he made his debut with the Israel Philharmonic and Zubin Mehta performing Saint-Saens' Cello Concerto No. I in a televised appearance. Since then he has performed with such conductors as James Levine, Daniel Barenboim, Charles Dutoit, Sir Neville Marriner, Seiji Ozawa, Leonard Slatkin, and Michael Tilson Thomas. He has appeared as a soloist in North America with many of the great symphony orchestras and philharmonics, including those of Boston, Chicago,

Cleveland, Los Angeles, Montreal, New York, Philadelphia, and San Francisco, and internationally with the Berlin Philharmonic, the Orchestre de Paris, Philharmonia Orchestra of London, the Radio Orchestras of Frankfurt, Cologne, Leipzig, and Hanover, the New Japan Philharmonic, the Beijing Opera Orchestra, and others.

Not just "another prodigy", Haimovitz's career was launched by a notable performance at Carnegie Hall at age 13, replacing his teacher, Leonard Rose, in a quintet which included Isaac Stern, Mstislav Rostropovich and Pinchas Zukerman. At 17, Matt Haimovitz signed a ten-year exclusive recording contract with the Deutsche Grammophon label (DGG) that resulted in six acclaimed recordings documenting his development from a cellist firmly rooted in the romantic virtuoso tradition to an artist unafraid to delve into all corners of the contemporary imagination. The breadth of his repertoire today is rich and ever-expanding, and his approach makes listeners appreciate familiar pieces with a fresh ear and open mind, as he embraces new music and works from the traditional concert repertoire with equal focus.

Recently, Matt Haimovitz has toured "After Reading Shakespeare," new works composed for him by Pulitzer Prize Winning composers. Matt Haimovitz has brought his performances of Bach Suites, as well as a new music repertoire, to bars, cafes, and other alternative spaces where classical music is not usually heard. His unique style of playing, combined with his non-traditional choice of venues, has earned him much critical praise and acclaim. In 2004, the American Music Center awarded Haimovitz one of its highest distinctions, the Trailblazer Award, for his far –reaching contribution to American music.

Guest Performer Bios

David Schepps, UNM cello professor and New Mexico Symphony (NMSO) cellist, has been a soloist and chamber musician for National Public Radio's "Performance Today," Lincoln Center's Bruno Walter Auditorium, the Phillips Collection (Washington DC), concerts in Taiwan, Switzerland, Germany, England, Italy, Canada, Mexico. He has won competitions and soloed with regional orchestras, and is soloist next season with the NMSO. He has played in the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, L'Orchestre de La Suisse Romande, Phoenix Symphony and Kansas City Symphony. Schepps has performed duos with cellists Matt Haimovitz and Wendy Warner, bassist Gary Karr, and in chamber music with cellists Lynn Harrell, Laszlo Varga, Yehuda Hanani, Timothy Eddy and Joanna DeKeyser. Schepps was a Fulbright student of legendary French cellist Pierre Fournier, studied at Manhattan and Mannes Schools of Music, and holds a doctorate from Arizona State University.

Felix Wurman, a member of the NMSO, was given a cello at age 7 and performed publicly at age 12. He studied privately with Jacqueline DuPre for two years, was a participant in the Open Chamber Music Festival at Prussia Cove in Cornwall, England, and founded the Chamber music group Domus which performed in a portable geodesic concert hall throughout Europe. Wurman returned to Chicago to join the Lyric Opera Orchestra. An interest in Bach and the growing popularity of period instruments led him to Amsterdam to study under Anner Bylsma who encouraged him to build a five-string cello. He runs Albuquerque's "Church of Beethoven," giving regular Sunday morning concerts.

Joan Zucker, the NMSO's Principal Cellist was first heard by New Mexicans in the mid-seventies, as jazz cellist with the Johnny Gilbert Quartet and Principal Cellist of the Orchestra of Santa Fe. Since then she has performed in many of New Mexico's finest ensembles, from the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival and Opera, to Twentieth Century Unlimited. She has performed as concerto soloist and recitalist, and in numerous chamber groups, orchestras, and festivals in the United States and in Venezuela, her home for four years. Zucker is a versatile musician who has taught extensively (cello, recorder, voice, orchestra, chamber music, theory, composition and improvisation), both privately and at various institutions including U.C. Santa Cruz, Ithaca College, and UNM. A native New Yorker, Joan holds music degrees from Bennington and Ithaca Colleges.
